Chocolates were distributed to all the female visitors and staffs along the ongoing programme.


The aim of the celebration was to show our respect and gratitude not only for the female staffs of PNHZP but

RESEARCH WORK CARRIED OUT IN THIS QUARTER

• Project Red Panda Augmentation in Singalila National Park:

In the ongoing project, this quarter the radio collars were being tested on aRed Panda to check their proper functioning. For this, the model of the radio collars used were Lite Track 130 TRD-L, these collars helps the researchers to collect baseline data like, daily movements, behavioral data and as well as the geographical location of the Red Pandas. Radio tracking involves fitting the study animal with a radio collar. These collars are designed to minimize impact on the animals' behavior and to maximize their detectability. The wireless operating license was received on 22.10.2020 valid up to 30.06.2021 and the Iridium satellite subscription was activated on 06.11.2020. One male red panda, Noel, fitted with radio collar. Theanimal adapted quickly to the collars and no behavioural deviations were noted. The collar was working well and remote schedule sent by the connecting collar to computer.







• Project "Study on hematology and blood biochemistry of various species of captive mammals at Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park":

In conjugation with the ongoing study on blood and serum biochemical values of various captive mammals at PNHZ Park, an opportunistic investigation was conducted on a rescued common leopard which was brought to the park on 3rd January 2021, in an injured condition for treatment. After 18 days of its arrival in the Veterinary hospital of the park, blood samples were collected on 22nd January and 15th February 2021by physically restraining the animal in a squeeze cage. Phlebotomy was done from the lateral coccygeal vein and the blood samples were placed in vacutainer EDTA and Serum separator vile for analysis.

Hematological parameters like Hb concentration, Total RBC and WBC count, differential count, PCV, ESR, and RBC indices were evaluated. For biochemistry, SGPT, SGOT, CRE, ALP, GLU, CHOL, TRI, TPROT, ALB, BUN, Ca, Phos, Mg, Chloride, Uric acid, and electrolyte (K and Na) were recorded.

The values for most of the above-mentioned parameters were observed to be similar to those of the captive leopards housed at PNHZ Park and Bengal Safari, Siliguri. However, a slight increase in cholesterol level was seen in this duration. This may be due to the availability of feed and lack of exercise. Throughout the study, the value of uric acid was always below one, contrary to those of other captive leopards.

Since baseline hematological and serum biochemical values that can be used to assess the health status of Indian leopards is still lacking (Shanmugam *et al.*, 2017), our study will augment more database to generate a concrete reference interval for this subspecies.
