


During this quarter the education wing of the Park attended to 375 students and 43 faculties from 9 institutes.

CELEBRATION OF WORLD WILDLIFE DAY, 2018

Every year on 3rd March 2018 the world celebrates World Wildlife Day. The theme for this year World Wildlife Day was "Big Cats: Predators under Threat". Big cats are among the most widely recognized and admired animals across the globe. However, today these charismatic predators are facing many and varied threats, which are mostly caused by human activities. Over the past century we have been losing big cats, the planet's most majestic predators, at an alarming rate. World Wildlife Day 2018 gives us the opportunity to raise awareness about their plight and to galvanize support for the many global and national actions that are underway to save these iconic species.

In line with the UN General Assembly Resolution proclaiming World Wildlife Day, the CITES Secretariat calls on all member States and organizations of the United Nations system and other global, regional and sub-regional organizations, non-governmental organizations and all interested individuals, to: observe and raise awareness of the theme for World Wildlife Day 2018 in an appropriate manner; to associate the celebrations with major national and international conservation events, where appropriate; to organize campaigns to reduce the demand for illegal wildlife and their products using targeted strategies in order to influence consumer behavior; and to make use of the World Wildlife Day logo as widely as possible.

Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park celebrated World Wildlife Day on 5th March 2018. The park organized an outreach program for the students of the local schools. 3 students from class 7-8 from each school were invited to participate in a poster making and poster presentation competition held at the park. The theme for the poster making competition was same as the theme for the world wildlife Day i.e. "Big Cats: Predators under threat"

IAXIDERMY WORK DONE IN THIS QUARTER

- Added Formalin to Fish, Reptiles and Snake specimen in BNHM
- Skinned one Rose ringed Parakeet

Skinning of the specimen was done and preserved the same by using alum powder and carbolic acid and was kept as a rolled specimen.



• Skinning and Mounting of one Reeves's Pheasant

Scientific Name: Syrmaticus reevesii (Gray, 1829) (Acc No. A/PH/143)

Collection: From PNHZP, Date of Collection: 30.01.2018, Date of Mounting: 22.03.2018

Skinning:

The dead specimen was then laid on the table with the belly uppermost. The belly and the breast feathers are parted along the centre of the body were a bare strip of skin is shows plainly. An incision is made in the skin

throughout the full length of the abdominal wall intact. The skin and body wall are easily separated. After making the incision, the skin is pulled free from the breast meat. Alum powder should be sprinkled frequently to absorb blood and to have a firm grip while skinning the bird. Skinning of the specimen was done and preserved the same by using alum powder and carbolic acid.

Mounting of Bird: First an artificial body is made with the help of soft jute wrapped into a galvanized wire pointed at both the end. This is folded into the middle and wrapped together firmly to make an ovate body core. Around this body core flat ward of jute are wrapped, and this is continued till the pear shaped form is obtained.

Next step is to cut and sharpen the neck, leg, and tail wires. The two legs wire is cut two and a half times the length of a leg from the knee to the ball of the foot. These were sharpened at one end only

The leg wire was wrapped with cotton to fill up the vacant space, and the leg wire was inserted through the tarsus and was locked within the artificial body. One end of the body wire was inserted through the skull and the other end through the tail. After that the vacant portion of the body was filled up by using cotton to give the proper shape of the body. After that the body was stitched.



- Four numbers of dead **Indian roofed turtle** *Pangshura tecta* was acquired from PNHZP no 19.03.2018, it was then preserved by adding formalin in Glass jar for further display in BNHM.

ENRICHMENT IN THIS QUARTER

The enrichment work taken up in this quarter include new resting platforms and aerial walkways in the carnivore section. New nesting boxes were also put in the pheasantry and substrate enrichment was also done by putting dry leaves in the pheasant enclosures. Substrate enrichment was also done in the lesser carnivore enclosure by using dry leaves and and logs. In the herbivore enclosures wooden stumps were placed as for the high altitude herbivores to climb on.
