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# From the Directors Desk...

The Park was delighted to receive The Honble' State Tourism Minister, Shri Gautam Deb on 24.04.2017. Sir Deb visited the Bengal Natural History Museum and the display area of the Park.

The Park in this quarter celebrated International Biodiversity Day on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2017 and World Environment Day on 5<sup>th</sup> June 2017. Extempore competition and painting competitions were organized with various topics given to the students to present their view on the theme "*Biodiversity and Sustainable Tourism*" and "*Connecting People to Nature*". The Park during such occasions takes an opportunity to convey the message about environmental awareness and the efforts done by the park towards conservation.

In this quarter the Park witnessed the birth of some important high altitude species like the Himalayan Tahr (*Hemitragus jemlahicus*), Himalayan Goral (*Nemorhaedus goral*) and Markhor (*Capra falconeri*). Enrichment works were done in various animal enclosures aiming towards their welfare. A rescued Indian Rock Python (*Python molurus*) have been treated and quarantined and have now adjusted in captivity. The visitors have shown an interest in watching this individual in its enclosure.

Various educational institutions, research and training institutes throughout this quarter requested for an educational tour for their students and trainees. The park's Research & Education section caters to their requests with well laid out programme for the day. This has helped the Park towards disseminating knowledge not only on the Himalayan fauna but also on the biodiversity of the eastern Himalayan region.

The Park also equally laid emphasis towards the beautification and maintenance of the Park.

## OUTREACH PROGRAMME

The outreach programme of the Park involves students of all levels including trainees. The programme includes a tour of the park followed by an interactive session where topics such as role and functions of the modern zoo, conservation breeding programmes, environmental issues and the work of the zoo in working towards conserving rare and endangered species are discussed. Educational material regarding information on the housed animals of the park, conservation breeding programmes of the zoo, its biodiversity etc. are distributed to the students along with notebooks and refreshments.

### INTERNATIONAL BIODIVERSITY DAY, 2017 CELEBRATION

Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park organized International Day for Biodiversity on 22<sup>nd</sup> of May 2017. The theme for this year's Biodiversity day was "*Biodiversity and Sustainable Tourism*". The chief guest of the event was Shri V.K Yadav, IFS, Member Secretary, West Bengal Zoo Authority.

An extempore competition involving the students of different schools of Darjeeling was organized at the Bengal Natural History Museum auditorium by the zoo. Two students from either or class IX and X from twenty different schools were invited to participate in the competition. The extempore completion was judged by Dr Uttam Mani Pradhan, Veterinary Officer, Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park and Mr Saibal Sengupta, Assistant Teacher, St Roberts Higher Secondary School, Darjeeling.

### WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY, 2017 CELEBTRATION

Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park, celebrated World Environment Day on 5<sup>th</sup> June 2017. This year's theme was "*Connecting People to Nature*". The park organized a sit and draw competition to celebrate the event and to educate students about environmental issues and the importance of working towards conservation. The invitation to participate in the event was sent out to 20 schools who were requested to send two students each from either or class IV and V along with a teaching staff. A total of 11 schools accepted the invitation to compete in the event. 22 Students and 10 teachers of different schools of Darjeeling participated in the programme.

The 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and the 3<sup>rd</sup> prize winners were given a cash prize of Rs 1000, Rs 800 and Rs 500 respectively along with a certificate, trophy and a book. ## SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT OF ANIMALS

An adult male Common leopard with the house name, Monu, frequently observed having an injury on its left forelimb, was treated successfully at the park. The animal was treated during the month of November and December with antibiotics and regular dressing. On 11<sup>th</sup> January, the common leopard was physically restrained and thorough checking of the wound was done. The animal has healed and is shows no limping.

## ANIMAL EXCHANGE PROGRAM

An animal exchange program between the National Zoological Park, Delhi and Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park took place under the order of the Central Zoo Authority. Lady Ahmerst (0:1) and Barking deer (1:0) from Darjeeling zoo was taken by Mr Pradeep Singh, Veterinary compounder, Mr Deepak Roka, Assistant Animal Supervisor and Mr Ruden Lepcha, Zoo keeper on 21.02.2017 and Himalayan Goral (1:2), Barking deer (2:0), Kaleej pheasant (0:2) and Red Jungle Fowl (2:3) was brought in exchange on 01.03.2017. The purpose of animal exchange is to increase the animal collection and to diversify the gene pool of the concerned animals.

## STAFF RETIREMENT AT PNHZP

On 31<sup>st</sup> March 2017, Mr Sang Dorjey Tamang, Head Clerk retired after 34 years of service. Mr Tamang joined the park on 1<sup>st</sup> February 1983. A farewell function was organised by the staff of Darjeeling zoo on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2017 tobid farewell and to honour Mr Tamang for his invaluable service to the park. The farewell function was attended by all members of the staff including the Director, Mr Piar Chand, IFS who along with other officials thanked Mr Tamang for his service and honored him by presenting him with a gold ring. The program ended with the distribution of refreshments to all the staff of the park.









## WORK DONE AT TAXIDERMY UNIT, BNHM

The taxidermy unit at Bengal Natural History museum under PNHZ Park has undertaken the work of preserving all the existing specimen at BNHM as well as new specimens that are brought to the museum. The Taxidermy work is done by Mr. Sairus Bhaktaraj under the supervision of Mr Arun Gupta, Former Scientist and Mr. Shivbachan Ram, Former taxidermist of the Indian museum. The work includes labelling specimens, preserving specimens by using chemicals, cleaning and maintenance of pre-existing specimens on display, skinning and mounting of new dead specimens collected from Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park and surrounding areas. This quarter skinning of 2 birds, 1 pheasant and 1 mammal has been done.


